





Women's Oppression Around the World By Marisol Santoyo

A long history of authoritarian governments has suppressed women around the world. Those regimes have been increasing their mandatory rules against women. In those countries, democracy does not exist. They control everything as if women are objects. Women don't have the opportunity to decide, to think, to choose, or even wear wherever they want.



One example of life under an authoritarian regime was spoken about in freedomhouse.com by an activist woman who was born in Afghanistan. She said that when she was five years old, she

went with her mother and cousin shopping. Her cousin was the same age as her. When the Taliban saw they were without veils covering their heads, they started beating them.

This event was terrible and traumatic for her. She had nightmares and stopped playing outside the house. Her parents decided for her not to go to school, so she had to help at her mom's house. Now she is in law college and never thought that the Taliban would come back in 2021. Her family continues to live in Afghanistan.

Women continue to be oppressed. It doesn't matter if the country where women live is democratic or socialist, it has the power to manipulate women. Evil rebels are capable of taking retaliation against them because they are on the streets all the time with rifles and people are intimidated.

Another exploited group is Latina mothers. An investigation presented by the Society For Social Work and Research showed that Latina mothers are exposed to violence and oppression in their own countries. Most of them want to experience a new life immigrating to the U.S., but they feel oppressed by the immigration institution here because their status is not legal in this country. These women also feel fear asking for help because they think that they could be deported. All those women experience difficulties in their lives.

Recently we saw that Iran is a country that makes suppression and restrictions to civil liberties. In September 2022, morality police arrested Mahsa Amini who was 22 years old. She was not wearing her hijab properly. They battered her to death. More than one hundred cities protested to demonstrate their support for women; however those events did not result well because with that demonstration came many more tragic deaths because the authoritarian regime did not provide them protection.

Although the international community provides support especially for women's rights, the international community did not do much for them.

Supposedly human beings were born to be free and to be able to choose everything we would like to do for our happiness; however we continue to fight for our rights.

La Malinche (1500-1529) By Gerardo Garcia



Malitzen, also known as La Malinche, was born around 1500. She grew up in a region of the Yucatan Peninsula. Her parents named her Malinalli after the goddess of grass. She was sold as a slave to different people and was forced to work against her will

((PD-old)) cleaning and cooking. She was a smart woman because she learned Yucatec and Nahuat, the languages of the Mayan and Aztec people.

In 1519 when Hernan Cortes arrived at the city of Pontonchan, the people gave him a few women slaves as a sign of peace. Malitzen was one of them. She was renamed Marina by a Catholic priest.

When Hernan Cortes learned that Malinche had skills to speak two of the most important languages, Yucatec and Nahuat, he used her to translate for the people who didn't speak Spanish when she learned how to speak Spanish. Hernan Cortez took her as his personal slave, and she served as Cortes's interpreter.

Malitzen's life changed a lot as Hernan Cortes took her as his personal slave. She helped him to make alliances with tribes who were tired of Aztec rules. Malitzen participated in all the major events of the Spanish conquest of Mexico through the fall of Tenochtitlan in 1521.

After the conquest of the Aztec Empire was complete, she decided to live with Hernan Cortes and in 1522 bore him a son named Martin. In 1524, Malitzen traveled with Cortes to Honduras. Malitzen helped Cortes to translate in Honduras. A few months later, she fell in love with one of his captains, Juan Jaramillo and got married. The marriage elevated her to the status of a free Spanish noblewoman.

Malitzen gave birth to a beautiful girl in 1526. She named her Maria. Thanks to her marriage to Juan Jaramillo, her children were part of the Spanish nobility. Having children and marrying a foreign person, she got an honorific, "Mother of the Mestizo Race". She died in 1529 being one of the most important women in the Spanish conquest of Mexico.

Elizbeth Blackwell By Miriam Perez

Do you know who Elizabeth Blackwell is? Well, she is the first woman in America to receive a medical degree. Elizabeth faced many rejections in order to be accepted into a medical college. After struggling for a while, she got accepted into Geneva Medical College which was located in New York. She got accepted in 1847 and she



graduated in 1849.

After she graduated, Elizabeth Blackwell founded the New York Dispensary for poor women and children. Elizabeth provided free healthcare to women and children who were (PD-Arth) struggling with

money. She was also very motivational to other women who were interested in medicine. Elizabeth established her own medical college for women in 1867 at the age of 46. Elizabeth Blackwell inspired many women to overcome obstacles in order to make their dreams come true.

Women's Suffrage By Maria Garcia



In July 1848, Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott started the women's rights conference in Seneca Falls, NY and this conference officially began the women's suffrage movement.

These two women were fighting for equality and voting rights for women in the United States. Elizabeth Cady also fought together with Susan B. Anthony who was the most important woman in the women's suffrage movement. They worked hard together for women's voting rights for almost five decades. They used different ways to protest around the 48 states, even risking their freedom. Although many people agreed with them, others did not, but nothing stopped them in their fight.

This movement won a battle when on February 3, 1870 the Congress passed the 15th Amendment granting voting rights to all African American men, but they did not totally agree because it did not include women, but they didn't give up fighting.

In 1869, Elizabeth and Susan formed the National Woman Suffrage Association (NWSA) together with Lucretia Mott. Finally after decades of struggle and suffering and with most of the states in favor of suffrage, the Congress passed the 19th Amendment ratified on August 18, 1920 granting all American women the right to vote.

Blanche Stuart Scott--First Woman Pilot in North America By Maximina Perez

Blanche Stuart Scott (1885-1970) was the first North American Woman who had the courage to fly a plane. This happened in 1910.

Blanche was born in Rochester, New York on April 8, 1885. From a very early age, she loved to explore everything. She attended a school for girls, a seminary, and also a school for ladies. The school for ladies didn't work out because Blanche was very active. She was interested in knowledge.

In 1900, Blanche got interested in automobiles. At that time there were no restrictions for driving age, so at the age of 13, Blanche was driving already. The city wasn't happy about this; they tried without success to prohibit her from driving. Blanche became the second woman to take a trip across America.



This trip started in New York City and it was on May 16, 1910. 68 days later, Blanche was in San Francisco, California. She was pleased with this trip; she found it educational. She also wanted to highlight that women can be self-sufficient.

At those times it was very difficult for women because they didn't have the right to have jobs or professions like men did.

At first Blanche thought that people who flew planes were foolish, not thinking that she would

find herself in one; however Jerome Funciuill recommended Blanche to Glen Curtiss for flying lessons. Mr. Curtiss taught Blanche how to fly a plane. He was one of the first aviators and also an inventor. Curtiss wasn't excited about teaching Blanche because he was concerned about negative criticism of him and his company.

Blanche flew for the first time on October 23, 1910. This was the first time the public saw a professional female pilot. Her first long distance flight was 60 miles. It wasn't easy. Blanche was missing for an hour.

In those times only the Aero Club of New York provided pilot licenses. She didn't get one, and because of this, she was unable to fly in aviation events. She was disappointed about this, so she left New York and traveled to California in 1912. There she joined up with an aircraft designer by the name of Glenn Martin and he gave her more opportunities.

Blanche witnessed a terrible airplane crash in 1912. She felt nervous for a little while, but she didn't give up. In 1913, Blanche had an airplane accident, and it took her a year to recover. She kept flying for three more years, and in 1916, retired from aviation.

After her retirement, Blanche did many



interesting things in California like being a screenwriter and radio personality. She also wrote for RKO, Universal, and Warner Brothers. She also produced her own

radio show.

Blanche accumulated 1.25 million aviation artifacts and also was a special consultant for the Air Force Museum at the Wright-Patterson Base until 1956.

In 1953, the Aeronautics Association of the U.S. honored her. The Antique Airplane Association

did too. In 1980, the U.S postal service recognized her with a commemorative stamp.

Critics were unconvinced about women's abilities to deal with mechanical things, but she proved that women can achieve anything they put their minds to.

Frida Kahlo (1907-1954) By Yunuen Arevalo

Frida Kahlo was a Mexican artist who was a surrealist painter that worked with brilliant colored self-portraits. She also was a communist and feminist woman who defended her own ideology.

Frida Khalo had a difficult life because of her health. When she was a girl at the age of 6, she had a bout with polio. It left her a slight limp and at the age of 18, she suffered a bus accident in Mexico City. As a consequence, she was operated on more than 30 times during her life. Diego Rivera (a famous Mexican painter and muralist) was the great love in Frida's life. She met Diego in 1922, but it was not until 1928 that they reconnected and got married a year later, although her mother opposed. Immediately they moved to the USA because of Diego's work. In 1933, they returned to live in Mexico in the Casa Azul, the house where Frida grew up with her family.

The marriage between Frida and Diego wasn't a usual one in those times. They separated and returned several times during their relationship and had marital infidelity. Kahlo was also very sad because she couldn't have children as a consequence of her accident on the bus. Finally in 1939, they got a divorce and a remarriage with new rules in December 1940.

During her life Frida made between 150 to 200 paintings. In 1938, she had an exhibition in New York and in 1939 part of her work was exhibited in Paris. Now let's remember a few of her paintings: Frieda and Diego (1931); Henry Ford Hospital (1932); My Birth (1932); My Dress Hangs There (1933); The Suicide of Dorothy Hale (1939); The Two Fridas (1939); The Broken Column (1944); Without Hope (1945); and many others.

Frida died at the age of 46 from a pulmonary embolism.

In the year of 1958, Casa Azul was opened to the public like a museum where now we can enjoy part of the work and history of Frida Kahlo. In 1970, she was recognized as an icon of female creativity.

Indira Gandhi By Sonia Villa



Indira Priyadarshini Gandhi, daughter of Kamala Nehru and Jawaharlal Nehru, was the first woman Prime Minister of India. Indira's date of birth was November 19, 1917.

Later in life, she studied

at Somerville College in Oxford and her father Nehru was a member of the National Congress.

In 1942, Indira married a lawyer named Feroze Gandhi not related to Mahatma Gandhi. Five years later Nehru was elected as the Prime Minister of India, and his daughter Indira was named president of the Congress in 1959.

In 1964, Nehru died and the new Prime Minister was Lal Bahadur Shastri, but he died two years later, so Indira Gandhi was selected as the Prime Minister by Congress. During the first years being Prime Minister, Gandhi made programs that helped India to have sufficient food grain output.

In 1971, during the Pakistani War, Gandhi gave refuge to 10 million Pakistanis who were fleeing from the Pakistani army. Victory against Pakistan, brought about the creation of Bangladesh.

After three terms that Indira Gandhi served as Prime Minister, Indira was not allowed to run in another election because of her strict policies. By these policies, the constitutional rights of Indians were limited. For example, the government forced sterilization as a form of population control, but this policy was not well accepted by the people.

In 1980, Gandhi was elected again as Prime Minister of India. Indira Gandhi traveled around India and the world.

In 1984, Sikh extremists took control of the holy Golden Temple in Amritsar, Punjab, India because they wanted a stand-alone state. Indian troops were sent to retake the temple by force. Unfortunately hundreds of Sikhs were killed.

In that year, Gandhi was assassinated outside of her home by two of her bodyguards who wanted revenge for the deaths that occurred in the Golden Temple.

These are some achievements of Indira Gandhi: -Diploma of Honour granted to her by the Argentine Society in 1971 for the protection of animals.

-Mexican Academy Award for liberation of Bangladesh (1972) -Mothers' Award, U.S.A. in 1953

Some of her publications: -"India" (London) in 1975 -"The Years of Challenge"(1966-69)



Katherine Johnson By Widji Setyani

Katherine Johnson was a small child of African-American descent who was an intelligent child, her curiosity was very high, and she really liked counting.

Katherine was the fourth of three children. Her mother was a teacher and Katherine wanted to be like her mother. As a child, she



always counted all the activities she did, such as walking, climbing stairs, washing dishes and helping her mother with the spoons and forks. Katherine always counted.

On August 26, 1918, she was born in West Virginia. Because of her intelligence, Katherine at the age of 13 was already in high school. Katherine was one of three very bright black students and she always outperformed her friends. At the age of fifteen, Katherine went on to attend college and majored in Mathematics at West Virginia State College where at age 18, she graduated summa cum laude with degrees in mathematics and French. After graduating from the university in 1937, Katherine was a mathematics teacher in elementary school. She really liked her job and her students.

In 1950, the American government's National Advisory Committee on Aeronautics (NACA) opened a job for African-American women to solve math problems, but at that time Katherine Johnson who was 34 years old, was not able to get the position because it was already filled. Katherine Johnson did not give up easily. The following year she applied for the job again and she was accepted. When she worked at NASA, she was one of the women who was very active in asking questions, loved to learn, and loved attending meetings being very curious about NASA. She worked on different space projects for them.

A few years later, the Soviet Union entered into a space race with the United States and sent a rocket ship into space. This is when Katherine Johnson's career as a mathematician began with her actively involved in the American space program. She worked as a "computer" calculating long strings of numbers. Without her contribution, the spacecraft could not reach its destination or return safely to Earth.

Katherine Johnson's other projects included Mercury, a program to send the first American astronauts into space and it was successful. The next project she worked on was the Apollo 12 which flew to the moon in November 1969, and Apollo 13 was launched on April 11, 1970, but it suffered an explosion in space. When the commander notified Mission Control of the problem, Katherine Johnson started to make calculations mathematically for the flight path to go perfectly, and this was the toughest challenge in her life. The Apollo crew followed all the instructions given by Katherine Johnson and managed to get back on track; she saved Apollo 13.

President Barack Obama awarded her the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2015, America's highest civilian honor for her contributions. She was born in 1918 in West Virginia and died on Feb.24, 2020. She was 101 years old. The pioneering legacy of this American hero will be remembered.

Dolores Huerta By Esmeralda Meza

Dolores Huerta is a labor and civil rights activist. She was born on April 10, 1930. Her goal was to become a teacher. She has an associate's degree from a community college near where she lived in Stockton, California. She also earned a teaching license at the University of Pacific's Delta College.

Dolores has a large family; she has 11 children. Dolores and her children believe in social justice. She believes in helping farmworkers and their families and children.



When she was teaching, she would notice that the children of farmworkers would come to class in poor condition. She really wanted to help the families, so she became an activist.

She talked to a Community Service Organization (CSO) worker and got to know Cesar Chavez. When she talked to Cesar Chavez, they had some ideas about farm workers. They wanted to help people improve their incomes for their families. Dolores and Cesar Chavez liked helping people and Latino community immigrants and farmworker, so Huerta and Chavez founded the National Farm Workers in 1962. They are the founders of the United Farm Workers (UFW). Huerta served as UFW vice president until 1999.

One of her biggest accomplishments was the grape strike. The grape strike started to help the people get better wages in farm working.

Discrimination also helped shape Huerta. A teacher where Dolores went to school was prejudiced. That teacher did not like Hispanics. Her college papers were so well written that the teacher believed she was cheating. White men beat her brother for wearing a zoot suit in 1945.

In 1988, Dolores got assaulted by a San Francisco police officer too. I believe that Dolores through the struggles that she had to overcome is a great leader in the Latino community.

Huerta believed in no gender discrimination in agriculture. Dolores made a lot of plans for the people in farm working. She also worked in the women's movement.

In 2012, President Obama presented her with a Medal of Freedom for her work with farmworkers, immigrants, and women. She really liked helping the people in agriculture and immigrants.

After she left the union, her work focused on women's rights. The foundation of Dolores Huerta started in 2002. This foundation helps health and equality. She is a great woman leader today.

One of the most important opportunities that immigrants have when they learn English is to become a citizen because they have the right to vote.



Vaccines During Pregnancy By Marcela Martinez

Babies get protection (disease immunity) from

mom during pregnancy. When mom has been vaccinated against some disease, both the mother and fetus are being protected from some serious infections. After one vaccine is given to mom, she develops antibodies which pass to the baby. Those antibodies protect the baby for the first few months after birth until the baby is vaccinated.

Vaccines are safe and these have been given to millions of pregnant women, showing them safe for more than 50 years. Vaccines do not lead to risk after their administration or in the long term, on the contrary, vaccines can save the life of your baby.

The CDC and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists recommend these three vaccines during pregnancy:

☐ **Tdap vaccine**: This protects against whooping cough (Pertussis). If this infection is transmitted to a baby of three months or less, the baby can die.

- ☐ Flu Vaccine (shot): This infection is much more severe during pregnancy.
- COVID-19 vaccine: This infection can be more severe in this period too.

There are other vaccines that should not be given during pregnancy like:

- ☐ Flu vaccine in nasal spray form. Remember that the flu shot is safe.
- MMR vaccine (measles-mumps-rubella)
- Chickenpox vaccine

Keep in mind that to get vaccines during pregnancy is one of the best ways to protect your and your baby's health.

Vacunas Durante el Embarazo por Marcela Martínez



Durante el embarazo el bebé obtiene protección (inmunidad contra enfermedades) de la madre. Cuando la mamá ha sido vacunada contra alguna enfermedad, tanto la madre como el feto están protegidos de infecciones que pueden ser graves. Después de que se aplica una vacuna a la madre, ella desarrolla anticuerpos que pasan al bebé. Los anticuerpos protegen al bebé durante los primeros meses después del nacimiento, hasta que el bebé es vacunado.

Las vacunas son seguras y se han administrado a millones de mujeres embarazadas, demostrando su seguridad durante más de 50 años. Las vacunas no conllevan riesgo después de su aplicación ni a largo plazo, al contrario, las vacunas pueden salvar la vida de tu bebé. La CDC y el Colegio Americano de Obstetricia y Ginecología recomiendan estas tres vacunas durante el embarazo:

- Vacuna Tdap: ésta protege contra la tos ferina (Pertussis), si esta infección se transmite a un bebé de tres meses o menor, el bebé puede morir.
- □ Vacuna contra la gripe o influenza (inyección): esta infección es mucho más grave durante el embarazo.
- Vacuna COVID-19: esta infección también puede ser más grave en este período.

Hay otras vacunas que no se deben poner durante el embarazo, como:

- Vacuna antigripal en presentación en spray nasal, recuerda que la vacuna antigripal en inyección es segura.
- Vacuna MMR o triple viral (sarampión-paperas-rubéola)
- Vacuna contra la varicela

Ten en cuenta que aplicar vacunas durante el embarazo es una de las mejores y más importantes formas para proteger tu salud y la de tu bebé.






